

Big support for tiniest babes

A group of creative and crafty Caloundra Cay homeowners have made and donated more than 1500 garments to the Preterm Infants Parents Association (PIPA), a charity offering practical and emotional support to the families of premmie babies.

When retired nurse Ally Hurman moved to Caloundra Cay just on three years ago and became aware of the first-class facilities available in our Craft Room, she realised she had a vehicle to continue her association with PIPA.

"Six years prior to coming here I worked with people who volunteered their time to PIPA and I soon recognised what a special charity it is," she says. "My immediate thought was that there may be like-minded people in here, with similar skills, who would like to come on board and help. That idea has grown into something quite big - and extremely rewarding."

Nicknamed the 'Sew Good Knit-Witters' by the husband of one member of the group, a dozen homeowners get together in the Craft Room on Wednesday mornings to sew, knit and create comfort garments for premmie babies. These include blankets, jackets, hats, dresses and shirts, as well as peanut and horseshoe pillows. And, obviously, these items are tiny. For example, to knit a blanket takes just two balls of wool.

Every six months, a co-ordinator from PIPA travels from Brisbane to collect the items which are utilised at the Royal Brisbane Women's Hospital at Herston. The most recent delivery contained 300 pieces.

"Although we aren't actually counting, the number of garments created here and donated to PIPA in the past three years could be around the 1500-plus mark," smiles Ally, who describes the endeavours by the residents as extremely fulfilling and enjoyable.

"Not only are we helping the parents of premmie babies, who are seldom prepared for an early birth, but we are doing something we love. And getting together on a weekly basis is a form of therapy for most of us, who like a chat."

But while the activity may be therapeutic and the equipment provided by Palm Lake Resort of the highest quality, a monetary cost is incurred by the volunteers.

"It isn't a great amount, but we do have to buy our own raw materials," Ally reveals. "Because the clothing is for premmie babies, the wool and fabric – which must be cotton – must also be of top quality.

"And while we are happy to buy the wool and fabric ourselves, in the past we have received donations which have been gratefully received, and certainly appreciated."

Ally is joined in the Sew Good Knit-Witters' group by fellow homeowners Linda Hardman, Susan Gray, Colette Goschnik, Jenny Arthur, Maree Dixon, Shirley Parker, Ros Downing, Sharon Williams, Anke Thurman, Jan Killick and Dani Shaw.

OUR HONOURED AUSSIES: MEET NOEL KELK OAM

Salt water in his veins

The Order of Australia is an honour that recognises Australian citizens and outstanding achievement and merit in service to Australia or humanity. Tony Durkin continues our series on awardwinning Caloundra Cay homeowners...

According to well-known Sunshine Coast sporting identity Ashley Robinson, Caloundra Cay's Noel Kelk is one of the most iconic figures associated with Alexandra Headland Surf Lifesaving Club.


"Ask those who have been connected to the club for many years and they will say that Noel, alongside the Kenny, Wilkes and Buhk families, is the one of the first they think of when the history of the club is raised," says Ashley, who has been CEO of Alex Surf Club since 2010.

"He is hugely regarded in all areas of the Surf Lifesaving movement, well respected as a long-serving official and greatly admired as a former competitor. And his passion for protecting the ocean and those who love to use it, has been second to none."

In the Australia Day Honours list of 2014, Noel Kelk was awarded an Order of Australia Medal for service to the community through the Surf Lifesaving movement.

Noel, who moved to Home 176 at Caloundra Cay from Kawana Island with his wife, Nola, in August last year, joined Alexandra Headland Surf Lifesaving Club in 1953 and became a long-serving and dedicated life saver, branch official and surf sports competitor. He was also one of the crewmen in the inaugural Sunshine Coast Helicopter Rescue Service, and an original crew member of the Queensland Wales Helicopter Rescue Service.

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The OAM followed a long list of previous awards for his sustained and outstanding service, including Life Membership of Alex Surf Club, Surf Lifesaving Queensland, and Surf Lifesaving Australia, as well as the Sunshine Coast branch. He was made a Life Governor of Alex Surf Club in 1994 and, in 2000, was awarded a Sports Australia Medal.

Born in Nambour in 1940, Noel grew up on Bradman Ave, Maroochydore, and at age 13 joined Alex Surf Club - a decision at the time which was considered an oddity.

"It was a strange thing for a boy from Maroochydore to join Alex instead of Maroochy, but my two mates and I did it anyway," he recalls. "We were the first three boys from the Maroochy area to join that club and the journey has been both enjoyable - and incredible."

And while privileged to be awarded the OAM and multiple other honours, Noel never sought glory.

"I have lived near the water my whole life and was introduced to fishing and surfing at an early age," says the retired building contractor. "Surf lifesaving is all about the name – being on hand to hopefully help save a life. I never joined any other community service club because surf lifesaving was "it" for me."

While regarding himself fortunate to be considered someone worthy of the prestigious award and grateful to those who helped him along the way, Noel said the person he had to thank most of all was his late mother, Margaret.

"I really owe a lot to my mother, who let me join Alex more than 70 years ago," he reveals. "Mum was struggling to make ends meet on a war widow's pension, which was peanuts in those days. But she still managed to find the money which enabled me to join the club every year."

When nominating Noel for Life Membership of Surf Lifesaving Australia in 2003, fellow Alex Life Governor Ron Rankin says his involvement in several dramatic surf rescues emphasised his commitment to community safety and the humanitarian ideals of surf lifesaving.

"He was once also seriously injured while actively involved as a Rescue Crewman in the SLSA Westpac Rescue Helicopter Service," Ron recalls.

Noel was also a highly-decorated surf athlete, successfully representing Alex in numerous surf sports events including board racing, ski racing, surf belt racing and surf races at inter-club, branch, inter-branch, state and national levels over a period of more than a quarter of a century. He was also a member of three R&R teams that won gold medals at national level. And after finishing his competitive career, for more than 25 years, Noel was a senior official in surf sports at the Australian Championships and an examiner of lifesaving awards.

London accent unites Poms

An 'allo George' greeting one afternoon at bowls has led to the implausible realisation that two octogenarian Londoners could well have unknowingly crossed paths 49 years ago.

In a chat that followed that recent greeting, Caloundra Cay homeowners George Reid (Home 270) and John Hosegood (Home 134) discovered they travelled to Sydney from Southampton in 1973 on the same ship, SS Australis.

"That's the beauty of name tags," quipped George (now 83) who says he and John had never previously met when the greeting from his fellow Pom immediately stamped him as an ex-Londoner.

"It was an unmistakable accent and there was instant warmth. We chatted away and after swapping a heap of questions and answers, realised we arrived here on the same boat, on the same day. What an incredible coincidence."

While George - a single 34-year-old man at the time, looking for adventure - paid the full fare (110 pounds),

John, his wife and two young sons travelled as 'Ten-Pound Poms', an assisted passage migration scheme offered by the Australian Government.

Promising employment prospects, affordable housing and a generally more optimistic lifestyle, the scheme attracted almost one million Britons, with an estimated 75 per cent never returning home to live. At the time, Australian wages were up to 50 per cent more than those paid in England.

"The main stipulation of the assisted passage was that we had to stay in Australia for at least two years, but as a young family we had no issue with that," says John, 80, who re-settled in the Brisbane suburb of Inala following the six-week voyage.

"My wife was Irish, had an adventurous nature, and she made the initial suggestion. It took us 12 months to make up our minds and then get organised, but we never had any regrets. On the trip out here, we scored a well-appointed cabin next to the purser. Just outside was a reasonably sized hallway where we played a lot of indoor cricket. The boys – Ian and Jason - both celebrated their birthdays during the trip."

With the promise of a job and a house, sparkie John, wife Barbara and the boys travelled from Sydney to Brisbane by train and on the day they arrived, John had his first job interview.

"I started work a week later," he recalls, working for several different businesses before ultimately gaining his electrical contractor's licence at age 49, and then retiring to the Sunshine Coast 14 years ago.

George, who completed an apprenticeship as a print compositor, sold insurance and owned a local village store during a colourful adult life in England, had a more whirlwind start to his new life in Australia. Within six months of arriving in March, he had re-united with his sister

in Sydney, scored a job as a print sales rep, met his wife Robbie on a blind date and three months later they were married. And his career in the printing industry blossomed to the stage where he became National Sales Director of Rupert Murdoch's Progress Press, the biggest printing company in Australia.

"It was an action-packed start to my life DownUnder, but it was like a dream come true," he says. "The memory of sailing into Sydney Harbour remains as vivid today as it was almost 50 years ago. I thought 'Wow, how good is this place!' "

And in the following five decades George, with Robbie by his side, has traversed much of this great country, experiencing a life most would envy. They have owned, leased and managed motels and apartment blocks, lived on a five-acre farm in the Gold Coast hinterland, on a 36-foot boat at Hervey Bay and a 42-foot boat at Airlie Beach.

"We also travelled around Australia in a caravan for 14 months, so there aren't too many places we haven't seen," says George who retired only two years ago, and moved into Caloundra Cay with Robbie in September last year.

John spent his working life in Brisbane and lived in three different houses – at Inala, Jamboree Heights, and Middle Park – before relocating to Pelican Waters in retirement. In 2011, he lost his wife Barbara, and has since met his partner Margaret with whom he has shared their Caloundra Cay home for the past three years. After their boys settled into school, Barbara started casual work with Target, and eventually became the company's first female store manager in Queensland.

"We have absolutely loved it here in Australia," he says.

"Both the boys have done well in their chosen careers, have married and had children, and often thanked their mum and me for bringing them to Australia.

"Then, to meet George here, who lived just a few suburbs away in London and is now in the same Palm Lake Resort community, adds another chapter to what has been a truly amazing adventure."
