From trash to treasure.

THREE TIMES A WEEK, FOR THE PAST THREE YEARS, TOM WILLIAMS (HOME 94) SAT AT CALOUNDRA CAY BOWLS CLUB AFTER PLAY, COLLECTING RING-PULL TABS FROM BEER CANS.

His fellow players – many of whom enjoy a post-bowls beer – persistently quizzed Tom on why he wanted the seemingly-useless items. But just as persistently, Tom deflected the queries with "when I have done something with them, I will show you".

Finally, the day of 'show and tell' recently arrived. Tom, a retired TV set builder who once worked on *The Benny Hill Show* and *Fawlty Towers* at the BBC, ingeniously created a lizard. He intricately joined together an estimated 450-plus ring pulls, which he reckons took him "around 12 lazy hours".

"Maybe it's my creative background, but for a long time I've had this idea in the back of mind that these ring-pull tabs could be used for something. I kept collecting them, not knowing what that 'something' was," he says. "My first thought was a handbag, which I'd seen on the internet. But we have a wire-framed lizard ornament at home and one day I looked at it and the idea suddenly hit me."

Tom and his wife, Julie, both English born, emigrated to Australia in 1989 and initially settled in Perth, where Tom first scored a job with the Hole in the Wall Theatre Company and then Channel 7. On retirement, in 2016, they moved to an over-50s resort in Busselton, before deciding to move east, settling at Caloundra Cay five years ago. Tom says he will continue to collect more ring pulls, and will more than likely assemble another piece of artwork – maybe a jacket this time.

"But I'm open to suggestions," he quips.

CAREER SPORTS JOURNALIST TONY DURKIN (HOME 31) WAS RECENTLY HONOURED BY THE QUEENSLAND GOVERNMENT, INDUCTED AS A MEMBER OF THE SUNCORP STADIUM MEDIA HALL OF FAME.

It is the third award conferred in recognition of his four-decade involvement with rugby league. In 2015, Tony was made a Life Member of the Brisbane Broncos and five years later the Family of League organisation also inducted him as a Life Member.

"I am humbled, but honoured, to again be recognised for the very small part I have played in the promotion of a sport I love," Tony said after being admitted to the Suncorp Stadium Media Hall of Fame in July by Minister for Tourism and Sport, Michael Healy. "I was privileged to have had a career where I was paid to watch and report on sport. I can barely recall a day when I went to work not excited about what may unfold."

As Queensland Editor of *Rugby League Week* magazine for two decades, Tony's knowledge of the game was also leveraged by other media outlets. He was a broadcaster on Radio 4BC for most of those 20 years, and worked as a TV commentator/analyst on all three Brisbane commercial TV stations - Channels 7, 9 and 10.

After a seven-year stint as Communications Manager for the Brisbane Broncos following a decade editing the club's magazine, Tony retired to the Sunshine Coast in 2007 where he became a rugby league columnist for the *Sunshine Coast Daily* and an analyst for Zinc FM.

His journalism career started in 1969, as a cadet at *The Inverell Times* newspaper. He quickly progressed to Advertising Manager and in 1975 was appointed Managing Editor of the neighbouring *Glen Innes Examiner*. Three years later, at age 27, he became the youngest Editor of a daily newspaper in Australia when he joined the *Grafton Daily Examiner*.

But with sport in his blood, he could not resist the challenge in 1980 to take on the role of *Rugby League Week's* first Queensland Editor, a position that also included writing articles for *Australian Golf* and *Australian Cricket* magazines.

At a time when rugby league in Queensland was booming, and State of Origin was born, Tony forged further media relationships which led to a long association with Radio 4BC as a commentator and analyst. His expertise was also recognised by TV producers, and he evolved into a regular panelist on each of the three commercial TV networks.

For the first four years of the Broncos, Tony was part of the Channel 10 Queensland-based commentary team, covering two games each weekend. In 1994, he joined the panel of the Queensland Footy Show on Channel 9 and remained until it expired after a four-year run.

Following two decades with *Rugby League Week*, Tony was headhunted by the Broncos in 2000 to be the club's Communications Manager, where he remained until retiring to the Sunshine Coast seven years later.

Among the many highlights of his career, Tony counts five Kangaroo and World Cup Tours to Great Britain among

the most memorable, along with the first Origin match in 1980 and the first of the Broncos' six NRL premierships, in 1992.

"I have had the pleasure and honour of interviewing most of the superstars of the game from my era, and many have become friends," he says. "Being invited to join the Immortals' judging panel for four separate inductions (Graeme Langlands, Arthur Beetson, Wally Lewis and Andrew Johns) was a huge honour, as was being asked to deliver the rugby league eulogy at the funeral of one of the game's true legends, Norm Provan."

And when quizzed on what was his best 'scoop' as a journo, Tony did not waver.

"In April of 1994, I broke the Super League story, 12 months before one of the greatest revolutions in the code occurred," he says.

Again, there was no hesitation when asked who was the best player during his four decades closely involved in rugby league.

"Wally Lewis. There was nothing he could not do. He is deservedly crowned 'The King!'"

Tony and his wife Ange moved from their home in Buderim to Caloundra Cay in 2021, where they have both become involved in numerous activities and committees.

Go green

It's the obvious thing but a lush, green garden is ever so welcoming. Speak to your local nurseryman about what types of plants suit your home's position (closely observe how the sun falls on your various garden beds before you head to the nursery) and also take into account how green your thumb actually is. Choose hardy plants if you're a plant newbie to avoid disappointment! A simple irrigation system is worth the expense when setting up your garden – many can be controlled via an app on your smartphone when you're away on holidays.

Game on

You don't need a huge backyard to have a huge amount of backyard fun – in fact, there's a whole range of yard-friendly games on the market that won't break the bank. Classic Bocce can't be beaten. Lawn bowls lovers will enjoy Bocce as the objective is similar: get your team's balls closer to the pallino (the first ball put into play) than the other team's. Alternatively, you may want to invest in a Finska set. This game involves throwing a wooden block at a cluster of 12 wooden cylinders, which are marked with the numbers one to 12. You can even seek out jumbo backyard versions of those classic indoor family games like Jenga, chess and Yahtzee.

Grow your own

A small vegetable patch can reap big rewards, especially when it comes to the pride felt when eating your own homegrown produce. Even the smallest of garden beds can be utilised for a veggie patch or you could group together a few larger decorator pots filled with premium potting mix. Lettuce is an easy veg to grow that is also quick to reach harvest. There are also now dwarf tomato varieties that grow to roughly 50cm, which is perfect for a small veggie patch. Shallots, French beans and spinach are compact growers. Beetroot and onions don't take up too much space and are fun for the kids to dig up when mature. Preparing your ground

is key – use rich composted soil. Water and fertilise regularly for fast results. This is one project that's perfect to share with the grandies and maybe you can work with your neighbours to ensure a wide variety of produce is grown which can then be shared around.

Wriggling wonders

If you've committed to a veggie patch, another cool addition to a small backyard is a worm farm. For around \$150, you can set yourself up with a neat and compact worm farm and all the things you'll need to support your new little wriggly pets. Worms will compost your kitchen scraps while also producing worm 'tea' fertiliser and the richest compost/soil for your plants. When a worm farm is working efficiently, there's no smell. It's another one of those backyard beauties that the grandkids will LOVE! And, trust us, your neighbours will want some of your magic worm tea for their gardens too – bottle it up and share it around!

Garden art

Another way to bring 'wow factor' to your backyard is via garden art. There are endless options! Consider decorative screens/panels (widely available at hardware stores) which look great installed against a plain fence, or even statues and sculptural figures subtly installed among the greenery for a surprise 'pop' of interest. Water features provide the soothing sound of gentle running water while you can also paint a feature wall – they aren't just for inside!

Take a seat

A commonly overlooked element of backyards is seating. Create places to stop and take in the vista you've created. The more unexpected, the better. Maybe you can install a bench near your veggie patch that doubles as storage for a few small garden tools? Or position a couple of chairs and a small table to overlook the water feature? Sitting among the plants in your backyard, with the sun on your back, is proven to be amazing therapy.

Debbie's on a mission.

SHE MAY CURRENTLY BE ON A FIVE-MONTH, 20,000KM+ AUSTRALIAN ROAD TRIP - DRIVING ON HER OWN - BUT DEBBIE CAMPION (HOME 179) DOES NOT WANT TO BE REGARDED AS BRAVE, BULLISH OR EVEN 'A BIT MAD'.

"I'm simply an adventurer, traveling our beautiful country," says Debbie who, at 64 years of age, is doing something she loved to do with her late husband, Chris, before he passed away in May 2019 (the pair is pictured below, centre).

They had both retired as Commonwealth Public Servants by 2012, and moved from Canberra to their dream home on the coast at Tomakin, near Batemans Bay.

"Plans were afoot to see more of Australia. But, when Chris – a mad keen Essendon supporter - was diagnosed with prostate cancer in 2014, our plans took a back seat," she reveals.

Following the loss of her husband of 38 years, Debbie decided to be closer to their only child, Nicole, her husband Josh, and her granddaughters, who live in Brisbane, and moved to Caloundra Cay in June of 2021. While she was determined to continue her adventuring, she was not keen on towing their caravan to see Australia. So, in December 2022, she bought an Explorer Motorhome, in which – before this most recent trip – she had already covered more than 50,000 kms in just over two years. Built on a Toyota Hilux 4X4 chassis, the motorhome is fully self-contained, including an ensuite and washing machine, and is equipped to be totally off grid. She can access the motorhome from the vehicle's cabin, which is a crucial safety feature for her.

"I had learnt a lot from Chris when caravanning, so felt confident I could continue to explore Australia on my own with this very capable 4WD motorhome," says Debbie, who stays almost exclusively at free camps.

Technically, she is rarely alone on her adventures. Fully aware of the 'safety in numbers' adage, she mostly travels in 'tag along' and friendship groups when doing remote 4WD trips.

"My adventurous spirit comes from my dad, a 10-Pound Pom, and my grandfather, who loved having family gatherings in Australian National Parks," Debbie recalls.

Her current trip, with friends who have the same type of motorhome, started by heading out to Haddon Corner on the edge of Queensland, on to Cameron Corner via the Strzelecki Track, and then the Oodnadatta Track. The journey with her friends finishes in Alice Springs. Then, Debbie will join a tag along group of 10 vehicles with a professional guide, and travel to the Northern Kimberleys. She will finish in Broome, and take a cruise to Darwin, and then fly back to Broome to continue her journey.

"The cruise will be my holiday. I will be upgrading from dust and dirt to utter indulgence – but only for 10 days," she quips. "From there I will head to Katherine for another tag along to East Arnhem Land. I will then mosey on towards home on my own from Katherine, stopping to see other remote towns and sights in the North, Central and South Western Queensland regions, including Birdsville and Poeppel Corner. This will be my longest and most challenging adventure."

Without hesitation, Debbie rates reaching the tip of Cape York Peninsula as her greatest adventure, with a visit to Thursday Island – where she met Prime Minister Anthony Albanese (pictured below). And before this latest trip, a three-month tour of Tasmania had been her longest time away from home, a visit she refers to as her 'Australian history' journey.

While the primary motivation for travel is to continue to see more of Australia, Debbie also hopes her story will inspire other single women to 'make new memories', and for men to 'prioritise and monitor' their health.

"Sure, I am a driven person, very determined, strong willed and independent. But I miss Chris terribly, and get lonely," she confides. "Yet I am determined to make new memories, and I hope Chris would be proud of me."

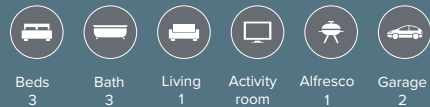

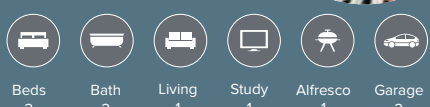

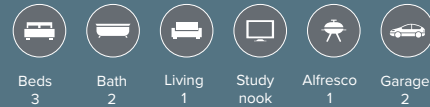
