Family history, uncovered.

IT’S AMAZING THE STORIES THAT PEOPLE HAVE TO TELL – JUST TAKE HOMEOWNER SUZANNE GURNEY.

A few years ago, Suzanne received an unexpected call from a long-lost family member who had been holding onto a number of family heirlooms and wanted to pass them on. One was a timber-framed photograph of a baby boy.

Suzanne instantly recognised the image. She remembered seeing the photo hanging on the lounge room wall of her grandparents’ house when she was young, though she had never known who the baby was. That mystery was finally solved when she turned the frame over and read the name written on the back: Maxwell Holmes Kennedy – Suzanne’s father. The photograph was taken in 1914, when he was just seven months old, and even the timber frame dated back to that same year. Behind the photo, the backing paper was made up of old newspaper clippings (*pictured right*) from The Telegraph, dated 1945 – a kind of time capsule of her family history.

Queensland-born Suzanne grew up around Brisbane, first in Alderley, living next door to her grandparents, and later in Wilston, in a home her father built himself. The street was filled with Irish immigrants, so the Kennedys felt right at home. Suzanne has fond memories of street cricket games played amongst the children.

She also recalls the time her father became a foreman with Kratzmann Builders, the company responsible for constructing Brisbane’s first high-rise residential building, Torbreck, on Dornoch Terrace in Highgate Hill. When it was completed, a three-bedroom apartment sold for £12,000, with a garage costing an additional £5,000. Today, the building still stands and is heritage-listed.

For much of her adult life, Suzanne lost touch with parts of her family, in part due to spending several years living in Papua New Guinea. When she eventually returned to Australia, she travelled to Allora in western Queensland to reconnect with relatives and learn more about her family history. During that visit, a trip to the local library uncovered another small clue: the librarian mentioned a man with the surname Kennedy who frequented the local pub. Suzanne’s maiden name was Kennedy too – perhaps, she wondered, he was a relative.

Years later, life once again brought things full circle. Suzanne purchased a unit in Torbreck from an old friend and undertook major renovations. While stripping away old wallpaper, she discovered her father’s handwriting, scrawled on the wall during the building’s original construction. It was another deeply personal link to her family, unexpectedly revealed decades later.

Suzanne lived at Torbreck for many years, commuting into the city while working at Myer. After retiring, she made the move to Palm Lake Resort Eagleby Heights – a decision she has never



regretted. Suzanne says she loves the sense of community and feels truly at home here.

So many of our Palm Lake Resort Eagleby Heights homeowners have stories just as rich and fascinating as Suzanne’s. I’ve always loved listening to what people uncover when they start looking back – and I’m sure you’ll agree.

PALM LAKE RESORT CALOUNDRA CAY HOMEOWNERS PUT THEIR MANY TALENTS TO GOOD USE, COLLECTING (AND MAKING) DONATIONS FOR THE ANNUAL SALVOS CHRISTMAS APPEAL.

In the lead-up to Christmas, **Palm Lake Resort Caloundra Cay** homeowners worked together to assemble 81 Christmas hampers for families in need across the Sunshine Coast. Retired Salvation Army Major and homeowner Maree Strong helped coordinate the effort, which evolved from a simple neighbourly suggestion into a well-organised collection and distribution process.

Adding a new element to this year's appeal, members of the Caloundra Cay Workshop also contributed 40 handmade wooden toys for children from recipient families. Suggested by workshop member Bruce Angus, the project involved hours of sanding, painting and finishing, with each toy requiring several hours of careful work. The toys were distributed alongside the hampers, complementing the food donations and no doubt promising a joyful surprise for recipients with children.



Doing good in The Long Run
