"The Springs by Palm Lake Resort" as it will be known, will feature more than 320 ultra-premium homes - think plunge pools, internal lifts, luxury golf cars and golf-car parking. Homeowners here will also enjoy the most luxurious resort facilities to date in an unbeatable natural wildlife-filled environment. All this, and their resort will sit immediately adjacent to our company's Greg Norman-designed Pelican Waters Golf Course, that is being reconfigured to accommodate the new homes. For our Head of Golf, Dale, and our very dedicated course greenkeeper, Troy, it was quite the bittersweet moment to watch the very official gold (spray-painted) shovel cut through the hallowed turf of the 18th green to 'turn the first sod' – but they know, along with all our golf club members, that it's all for a very good cause. What awaits this site is nothing short of spectacular. Our future over-50s homeowners, along with Pelican Waters Golf Club members and the rest of the local Pelican Waters community, will be able to take advantage of a host of incredible community facilities that the current golf clubhouse precinct will soon provide when it's redeveloped into "The Springs Hotel". You can read all about our over-50s resort, the golf course reconfiguration and the rebirth of our golf clubhouse to The Springs Hotel on Pages 10-11.

While the national construction industry currently faces issues associated with a shortage of building supplies, Palm Lake Group luckily does not. Our savvy construction management team highlighted very early on, many months ago, that a supply shortage was imminent, and we were able to place bulk future orders well in advance of the current situation. Our team's foresight has insulated our business to a large degree, which means our new projects and those refurbishment projects currently underway within our existing resorts can continue relatively unaffected. This includes the major refurbishment

and extension of the community hall at our very first property, Palm Lake Resort Willow Lodge (Victoria).

While we were on the Sunshine Coast to turn the first sod at The Springs by Palm Lake Resort, I was also excited to stop by the construction site for Palm Lake Care Caloundra to see how things were progressing. It sits adjacent to Palm Lake Resort Caloundra Cay. With earthworks in full flight and the site itself buzzing with construction equipment, there's a tangible excitement in the air there. Our last Caloundra Cay homes are also under construction right now, just like at Beachmere Bay and Toowoomba, while Cooroy-Noosa is officially sold out. It seems over-50s really are understanding just how safe, secure, supportive, convenient and downright fun our Palm Lake Resort communities are in this day and age.

As one resort project is completed, more are just beginning. Early in 2022, we will begin construction of 78 homes at Yamba (New South Wales) on a site directly across the road from our existing Palm Lake Resort address already in town. Around the same time, construction will commence at Paynesville (Victoria) on a project offering in the vicinity of 188 homes and other world-class facilities. We are also watching with awe as earthworks commence on our Palm Lake Resort Forster Lakes marina – what a brilliant community facility that will be! And we will also be eager to celebrate with the homeowners at Palm Lake Resort Bargara as their new country club is officially unveiled in November.





Palm Lake Care Toowoomba was built to stand out among other aged care providers and it was proven when this community picked up the coveted Master Builders Queensland Housing and Construction Award for Community Accommodation (Downs and Western region) in recent weeks.

MASTER BUILDERS QUEENSLAND was thrilled to welcome a live crowd to the event on July 31. Despite challenges for the industry being far from over, judges said this year's field rose above the adversity brought about by ongoing trade and materials shortages and price hikes, surprising and delighting them with the calibre of workmanship, superb finishes and detail in construction.

Palm Lake Group made a \$35 million investment in the construction of Palm Lake Care Toowoomba – the sixth aged caring community of its kind in the Group's portfolio. Since opening its doors shortly before Christmas, there's been a flood of local families looking to Palm Lake Care Toowoomba for premium care for their beloved family members, all in a luxury setting.

From a design perspective, when you approach Palm Lake Care Toowoomba's porte cochere, you are instantly captured by the grandeur of this building. A vast wall of sixmetre-high stone cladding contrasts distinctly against the equally as impressive wall of glass panels alongside it. This expansive glass wall allows energising sunshine to stream into the entry foyer to wrap residents and their guests in a warm and welcoming hug upon arrival.

Once inside the entrance doors, the luxury and opulence of this building is only heightened. Literally. Your eye is drawn up to the six-metre ceiling, courtesy of an impressive glass chandelier-style light fitting hanging centrally over a distinctive pattern in the large-format floor tiles in this foyer area. Stone cladding cleverly wraps from the external front wall into the foyer to sit as a backdrop to an enormous vertical garden and equally as impressive, rural-inspired commissioned art piece. Stereotypes of traditional 'nursing homes' are thrown right out the window, as this arrival experience is more akin to being in a high-end shopping precinct or luxury hotel. From the foyer, your attention is easily drawn down into the building courtesy of a curved wall. It takes your eye past the hairdressing salon, meeting rooms, Wellness Centre, Community Centre and the (wellstocked) Atrium Bar, into the first of many plush community lounges. All surfaces throughout this building have been given the luxury treatment. Think rich, textured wallpapers, more feature timber pillars, more stone cladding, plush


carpet and large format tiles. Gas fireplaces and slick builtin cabinetry provide literal and visual warmth to community areas, while high-end furniture pieces create intimate spaces for residents to wind down.

As far as the 146 resident suites go, each offers its own private ensuite bathroom, a wall of cleverly integrated cabinetry (that neatly conceals a large wardrobe, study nook, bar fridge, TV and storage galore), individually controlled air conditioning, direct dial phone line and, importantly, private access to the outside world from every suite via sliding glass doors. The layout and inclusions in each private suite enable residents to enjoy their independence and comfortable solitude, if they so desire, while the design of the greater community gives them the ability to partake in meaningful interactions with their neighbours. As for resident and guest facilities, Palm Lake Care Toowoomba offers its own Atrium Café, a dedicated indoor kids' zone, outdoor kids' playground, gymnasium, luxury movie cinema, private dining rooms and more. Precious time together with family, friends and visiting fur babies is made possible via free use of the separate guest house and alfresco areas throughout the expansive private parklands. Behind the scenes, a commercial kitchen and laundry ensure the residents' needs are not just met, but exceeded.

"The range of impressive community facilities proposed for this site will no doubt suit our local families – and will also help keep non-playing residents entertained while their other half is out on the greens enjoying a round or two!"

From a design perspective, The Springs will take its inspiration from Palm Springs and will be quite the holiday-every-day destination when complete. Inspiration for this design theme stems from Palm Lake Group's desire to create a residential resort that cultivates a sunny state of mind while channelling the Palm Springs brand of mid-century modernism. Think clean geometric architecture, natural material finishes and strategic pops of bright colour to brighten the every day. It is expected that The Springs by Palm Lake Resort will welcome its first residents late in 2022.



When it comes to your garden, size truly doesn't matter. All you need is a spot of sunlight, a sprinkle of quality soil and a bit of creativity, and you'll be reaping the rewards in no time.

Vertical gardens

Have you heard of soilless gardens? They're how some of Australia's best restaurants – including Wild Canary, the Manly Boathouse and Paper Daisy at Halcyon House – are cultivating their own fresh produce on-site using less than one square metre of space. One Brisbane-made vertical soilless garden, Airgarden (pictured above right), allows anyone from green thumbs to novices to sprout five times more home-grown produce than a regular garden, and three times faster, with 95 percent less water. Airgarden has repurposed aeroponics technology originally developed by NASA to grow plants in space, allowing Australians to cultivate a fresh garden of 150 different fruits and vegetables without digging, weeding or watering.

Plenty of pots

If you don't have the space for a built-in garden bed, or would simply prefer a more flexible approach, consider investing in an array of different-sized pots. This way, you can position (and reposition) your plants, vegetables, fruits and herbs wherever you like, changing things up as your literal and metaphorical tastes change. You could even have fun with it and group your plants by theme or cuisine – your Mediterranean herbs (think oregano, basil and rosemary) could live in pots of one colour, while your Asian herbs (chives, curry plants, coriander) could be in another colour. Go wild.



Want to maximise the space (or the appearance of space) in your small garden? Here are five important tips to keep in mind:

- 1. Make way for mirrors: Just as you would indoors, utilise mirrors to make your garden appear larger than it is. Hanging or leaning a mirror on your garden fence and surrounding it with tall plants to hide the edges can visually double the size of a small garden.
- 2. Hide the boundaries: Fences make you feel boxed in. Lush, leafy walls of greenery do the exact opposite. Consider planting a hedge or cultivating a vine-covered trellis to fill your garden with life.
- **3. Create zones:** Designating space for you to enjoy a morning cuppa or an afternoon drink, that is separate from your veggie patch or lawn, is key to making your space feel bigger - no matter the size.
- 4. Use the view: Some of our Palm Lake Resort homes are treated to beautiful vistas so if you're one of those lucky homeowners, celebrate it! Wherever possible, ensure you don't impede your view with taller plants – take particular care to keep things visually appealing from your outdoor seating area.
- 5. Add texture: Of course, a garden full of plants naturally has texture. What we mean is, opt for a variety of different-sized plants to create depth and space; think large, leafy bushes next to tall flowers, on a background of crawling vines.

Corn and kale fritters

Ingredients:

- 130g (4 ½ oz) kale, finely shredded
- · 2 small-medium corn cobs, kernels sliced off
- 6 organic eggs, 2 separated
- 100g (3 1/2 oz) buckwheat flour
- 2 tablespoons ghee, coconut oil or olive oil, plus extra olive oil for drizzling
- Smashed avocado, sliced jalapeños (optional) and a green salad, to serve

Tomato salsa:

- 2 ⅓ cups (350g) cherry tomatoes
- ½ red onion, diced
- · 4 coriander (cilantro) sprigs, finely chopped
- 1 dried smoked chilli (such as ancho), soaked for 10 minutes in hot water, then chopped

Method:

For salsa, toss ingredients together and season to taste with salt.

Preheat oven to 100°C (200°F). Stir kale, corn, 4 eggs, 2 egg yolks (reserve the egg whites), flour, 100ml (3 ½ fl oz) water and 1 teaspoon salt together well. Whisk egg whites to stiff peaks, then gently fold them through kale and corn batter. They'll deflate a bit, but the whites will help the fritters become nice and fluffy.

Heat a cast-iron frying pan over medium—high heat. Add half the ghee or oil, swirling to coat, then spoon in large dollops of batter. Fry for 2–3 minutes each side until nicely browned, then transfer to oven to keep warm while you cook remaining fritters.

Serve with smashed avocado, tomato salsa and a green salad drizzled with olive oil.

Heirloom spring carrots with almond-tahini purée and coconut dukkah

Serves 4-6

Ingredients:

- 2 bunches organic or baby heirloom carrots, scrubbed (skins left on if young)
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- · 2 handfuls wild rocket
- 2 handfuls radicchio leaves, larger leaves torn
- 2 handfuls snow peas
- 1 tablespoon Coconut dukkah (see page 247)

Almond-tahini purée:

- 3/4 cup (200g) tahini
- 3 ½ cups (350g) almond meal
- 1 ½ teaspoons lemon juice
- 1 garlic clove

Garlic-maple dressing:

- ½ cup (125ml) extra-virgin olive oil
- · 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1 tablespoon maple syrup
- 1 teaspoon Dijon mustard
- 1/2 garlic clove, crushed

Method:

For almond-tahini puree, combine all ingredients in a blender with 400ml (14 fl oz) cold water and 1 teaspoon salt and blitz until smooth. Season to taste. Keep refrigerated for up to five days.

Preheat oven to 220°C (425°F). Spread carrots on a roasting tray, drizzle with olive oil, season with ½ teaspoon salt and roast for 5–10 minutes until carrots take on a lit-

tle colour but still have some firmness. Meanwhile, wash and trim salad and snow peas. If snow peas are lovely, tender and young, simply slice them into thin batons that can easily be mixed through the salad (otherwise steam them briefly). Dry salad leaves thoroughly and mix with the snow peas.

For the garlic-maple dressing, whisk all ingredients together until well combined. Season with ½ teaspoon salt.

Remove carrots from oven and allow to cool a touch. Spread almond-tahini puree on one side of a serving platter to form a bed for carrots, then arrange them on top. Dress salad with garlic-maple dressing, toss well, then transfer onto the platter beside the carrots. Sprinkle dukkah over the top to serve.



Beetroot and carrot muffins

Makes 16-18

Ingredients:

- 1 cup (200g) rapadura sugar
- 1 cup (160g) brown rice flour
- 1 heaped tablespoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 4 cups (600g) grated purple carrot
- 2 cups (280g) grated beetroot (scrubbed, skin on)
- ¾ cup (180ml) olive oil
- 3 organic eggs

Golden beetroot icing:

- · 200g golden beetroot (beets), peeled
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 50g (1 3/4 oz) raw sugar
- $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon pectin
- ½ teaspoon ground ginger
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

Method: For golden beetroot icing, cover beetroot with water in a small saucepan, bring to the boil, then reduce heat and simmer until soft. Cool, then puree with lemon juice in a blender. Transfer to a saucepan. Whisk together sugar, pectin and spices, then add to beetroot. Bring to a gentle simmer to activate the pectin, stirring occasionally. Cool to room temperature, then chill.

Preheat oven to 170°C (325°F). Whisk together sugar, rice flour, baking powder and cinnamon in a large bowl, then add carrot and beetroot. The sugar in the mix will begin to macerate the vegetables and draw out their juice. Pour the oil over this mix and gently fold it through. Whisk eggs in a separate bowl, then add them to the batter and fold through until thoroughly incorporated. Transfer batter into lined muffin moulds and bake for 15–20 minutes or until a skewer inserted comes out clean. Top each muffin with a spoonful of golden beetroot icing, dust with sumac or beetroot powder and serve with whipped yoghurt or coconut cream.

Pea and goat's curd tart

Serves 6-8

Ingredients:


- 2 3/3 cups (400g) fresh or frozen peas
- · 4 organic eggs
- 200ml (7 fl oz) single (pure) cream
- 2 tablespoons mint leaves, plus extra to serve
- 1 1/4 cups (150g) soft goat's curd, crumbled

Pastry

- 3 cups (300g) almond meal
- 100ml (3 ½ fl oz) olive oil
- 1 teaspoon thyme leaves

Method: Preheat oven to 180°C (350°F). Grease a 26 cm (10½ inch) loose-bottomed tart tin. For pastry, place ingredients in a bowl, add 2 tablespoons water and 1 teaspoon salt and mix together by hand until a smooth dough forms. Roll out dough, then use it to line tart tin, spreading it over the base and up the sides with your hands. Chill for 30 minutes, then fill tart shell with baking paper and baking weights and blind-bake for 10 minutes. Cool shell to room temperature.

To make filling, blanch peas in a large saucepan of boiling salted water for about 30 seconds (up to 1 minute if they're frozen). Drain and rinse under cold water. Place eggs, cream and mint in a bowl with a quarter of the peas and half the goat's curd. Blend with a stick blender, adding ½ teaspoon salt. Scatter all but a handful of the remaining peas into the tart base, then pour over egg and cream mixture. Crumble remaining goat's curd over the top and scatter with remaining peas. Carefully transfer tart to oven and bake for 30 minutes or until centre is only just set (it will continue to cook out of the oven so don't overdo it). Allow to cool for at least 15 minutes before teasing tart from tin. Serve topped with extra mint.



Face yoga

Yes, you read that right! Much like you can bend your body into a bhadrasana (butterfly pose), there are 'poses' you can do with your face to soften and relax your face muscles. Combined with special massage techniques, face yoga is believed to not only stimulate your facial muscles, skin and lymphatic system, but also alleviate stress. It's a preferred method for those who are on a mission to age gracefully in a natural, affordable way, and some research has shown that face yoga exercises can improve appearance.

Laughter yoga

It may sound silly, but laughter yoga is no joke (pun intended). This modern form of exercise was founded by Indian physician Madan Kataria as a way to stimulate the physiological and psychological benefits of spontaneous laughter. Typically done in groups, eye contact and playfulness are key to a great laughter yoga session – more often than not, the forced laughter becomes real (and very contagious), which is where the benefits come in. There are a whopping 5000 laughter yoga clubs worldwide, across 53 countries. Need to let your anger out? Try tantrum yoga instead – a practice that sees you scream, stomp and pound your chest with frustration before, eventually, laughing!


NATURE CALLS

VIM AND REGINA Balachandran had been looking at over-50s lifestyle communities for a while. They were living in a golfing community on the other side of Brisbane and were growing tired of the upkeep their four-bedroom, multi-storey home was demanding of them.

"The other motivating factor was that my mother – who had been living with us for the past 10 years – had a few falls, so we knew we needed to find care for her, and soon," says Vim.

They spent time looking at different aged care providers and over-50s lifestyle communities, but none of them were the right fit. Either Vim's mum, Sashi, wasn't happy, or Vim and Regina weren't. Both he and Regina can visit Sashi every single day without having to get in the car, and Vim is happy to be able to do small things for his mother that he knows make her feel more at home – like washing her saris, which she wears every day.

"She figured that if she has to be in care, there is nowhere she would rather be," says Vim. "She looked at six other places but didn't love any of them. It's only been about a month, but she loves where she is now – the staff, the ambience, her beautiful suite. She has made friends fast too, which has helped a lot."

Vim and Regina have settled into life at Palm Lake Resort Beachmere Bay even faster. Avid golfers, they relish having a nine-hole course right on their doorstep and access to the 18-hole golf course at Pelican Waters Golf Club just up the highway. They also love that there is no need to keep their own golf buggy – there are plenty on-site for residents to use – and make good use of the state-of-the-art golf simulator at the resort's Shorehaven Golf Club.

"I have used similar technology before, but I've always had to book in and pay," says Vim. "Having one that I can use whenever I want to get a benchmark on my distances or play a virtual course if it's raining is fantastic."

It goes without saying that golf is a big part of Vim and Regina's life. They've been playing the game for 40 years and, for the past 15 years, most of their travel has revolved around golf. Old Head in Ireland and Troon North in Scottsdale, Arizona are among their favourite courses they've played.

"We spent 12-and-a-half months travelling the world, and played 56 games on 55 courses," says Vim. "There was one we just had to play twice!"

And while there are still plenty on their bucket list, the pair are finding the many activities on offer at Palm Lake Resort Beachmere Bay to be taking up more of their time than they'd thought.

"Whether it's lawn bowls or snooker, we love that there are so many things to do and so many people to do them with," says Vim. "Where we used to live, golf was the only thing available. There's an exciting new community model gathering attention at Palm Lake Care Toowoomba, for all the best reasons. Let us walk you through Riverton...

PALM LAKE CARE knows there's never a one-size-fits-all approach to caring. Every resident care plan is as individual and unique as the resident it's developed for. Being different is what makes humankind so special, right? At Palm Lake Care's newest location, Toowoomba, a brand new approach to caring is being fashioned with great success. Riverton is best described as Toowoomba's 'specialist care neighbourhood'. It's not your traditional dementia wing but neither is it a traditional Palm Lake Care community. Importantly, Riverton is not about segregating residents either. More so, as Palm Lake Care Toowoomba Service Manager Tony McKenzie describes, Riverton is a flexible hybrid community offering specialist care for a wider range of resident needs, supporting people to live lives filled with function and purpose.

"It's a flexible space whereby people with more specialised needs can feel safe, comfortable and supported," Tony says.

From a physical perspective, Riverton offers purpose-designed smaller and more intimate communal spaces.

Each suite offers a different coloured entry door which is colour-coordinated with a feature wall inside the suite, to help residents more easily identify their own space. There are identifiers on their fridge door and wardrobe cupboard

doors and Riverton suites do not offer individual external access, like the greater Palm Lake Care community. This has been done to reduce confusion and stimulation, removing the fear that, in low evening light, that beautiful tree might look like a person to some. Outside, in the Riverton courtyards, there are intimate sensory garden spaces complete with raised garden beds. Soft-fall pathways take residents on walks in the fresh air and sunshine but, cleverly, always lead them right back into the heart of the Riverton community.

From an emotional support perspective, Riverton offers specially trained caregivers who understand the more unique needs of these residents. It might be that a resident here lives with dementia, or they are bed bound, or they like to wander and may be exit-seekers. It might be that the resident has a specialist health concern that requires more intensive nursing. Maybe they simply cope better in a smaller group? Or, as one resident described, maybe they just want to be 'off the grid' for a while and retreat back to the sanctuary of Riverton after joining the hustle and bustle of the larger community.

"There's one-on-one guided support - both physically and emotionally – and it's all done without judgment. We are putting the residents back in control of their lives," Tony says. Another resident was chosen as a candidate for Riverton based on the fact that she had spent a lifetime as a busy carer and couldn't stop naturally 'caring' for her Palm Lake Care Toowoomba neighbours – to the point of interference and disruption to those other residents. A keen knitter and craftsperson, she was supported and guided to exert her energies into completing wonderful craft projects and helping caregivers with various daily tasks. She felt useful and was able to live an even more purposeful existence at Riverton.

It's important to note that residents are never 'locked in' at Riverton - even those requiring dementia support. Residents are free to safely roam around the neighbourhood - they are free to use the café and bar, to take in a movie at the on-site theatre or challenge a fellow resident to a game at the pool table. Those residents who wander and require a little more management simply wear a small bracelet that, on approach to certain doors, will close that door to prohibit them from walking into unfamiliar territory. These bracelets also help caregivers monitor residents' whereabouts and give them a chance to safely redirect the resident back to their local area, if required. Wearers of these bracelets are only those residents who have been fully assessed in consultation with their family and allied health professionals. Palm Lake Care Toowoomba Clinical Manager Jodi Harms says one of the most vital requirements when producing a successful care plan for any resident, but especially those moving into Riverton, is that families provide as much information about their loved one as possible.

"We like to know all about their interests and hobbies and what they did right throughout their careers because, for many residents, this gives us an indicative guide as to why they might be displaying a certain behaviour," Jodi says.

For example, a resident who might have spent a career managing people in a factory, might feel more comfortable holding a clipboard and ticking off 'jobs' on a daily task list.

"We are finding that many of our residents who have come to us from a lifetime spent in the country or working on the land have been very busy people and so they like routine and 'jobs'. They find purpose and function in being given tasks like setting tables, dishing up the meals, cleaning windows, sweeping floors or simply checking things off a list, for example," Jodi explains.

While Riverton is a first for the Palm Lake Care group, a similar neighbourhood is planned for Palm Lake Care Caloundra – the next aged caring community for the Group, now under construction. Deception Bay's 'Harmony' neighbourhood is also being remodelled and upgraded to become a specialist care area.

"We are changing the way we provide our service, and are forever grateful for all feedback, to ensure we are continually striving for improvement," Tony says.

A LOVE STORY FOR THE AGES

It's a love story that stretches 75 years and is still being lived out, right now, at Palm Lake Care Toowoomba...

It was a hot day summer's day in England and Stan Mayhew was working with his horses. A young lass, Jeanne, was doing her milk run on her horse and buggy.
